Papermaking with Plant Fibres with Lucy Baxandall

Sunday 29th August 2-5pm Drumelzier Village Hall £30 / £5 per person

Foraging for Colour Making Botanical Inks with Marissa Stoffer


Saturday 18th September 1-5pm Drumelzier Village Hall £30 / £5 per person

This creative workshop making botanical inks will connect us to our locality and ecology through the sharing of stories and history of often overlooked native plants. Led by botanical artist Marissa Stoffer we will forage for plants, taking time to slow down and observe what's around us. Back in the village hall Marissa will teach us how to extract the colour from the plants to make you own ink to take home.

Useful Information



Getting here

Borders Buses number 91 travels between Peebles, Drumezlier and Broughton. A timetable can be found here: <u>www.bordersbuses.co.uk/services/BORD/91</u>

If travelling by car from Broughton, take the A701 south and turn left onto the B712. Drumelzier village is 1.5 miles up the road from the turning.

If travelling by car from Peebles, take the A72 west out of the town before turning left onto the B712, signposted to Broughton. You will pass through the villages of Stobo and Dawyck before reaching Drumelzier, 6 miles on from the turning.

Parking

There is no parking available at the meadow. There is a small public parking area in Drumelzier, accessed by turning left off the main road when approaching from Peebles. Additional parking for the events is kindly being provided behind the Old Manse and will be signposted.

Space is limited and we would encourage anyone travelling to an event to car-share where it is safe to do so. Please do not park on the main road through the village, or on the side roads as this could block access for farm vehicles.

The meadow is a short 10 minute walk from the village along the B712. This is a relatively quiet road, however care should be taken as vehicles can pass at speed.

If dropping visitors off at the meadow, please take care when pulling back out onto the main B712 road.

Accessibility and Facilities

Workshops taking place in Drumelzier village hall will have access to toilets and drinking water. The hall is accessed via steps and a ramp and is therefore regrettably not suitable for wheelchair users.

There are no toilet or drinking water facilities available at the meadow. There are no surfaced paths in the meadow, however it would be possible to move about the meadow in an all-terrain wheelchair.
