Connecting Threads: Tweed River Culture

JOB OPPORTUNITY

River Culture Curator: Come and join the Connecting Threads team working along the River Tweed. This is an exciting opportunity for an experienced project coordinator / curator, with a background in culture and the arts, to oversee delivery of a varied and innovative cultural programme.

p/t 0.8 (30 hrs per week) £35,000 (£28,000 pro rata)

Connecting Threads is the cultural strand of Destination Tweed, a multi-part landscape scale project that includes the development of a new River Tweed Trail from source to sea. Connecting Threads engages with communities of interest (cultural, heritage, environmental and educational organisations) and communities of place along the length of the proposed 113-mile River Tweed Trail within the Scottish Borders, north Northumberland and Dumfries and Galloway.

Connecting Threads is delivered in partnership with Tweed Forum, and is funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund (NLHF), Esmée Fairbairn Foundation and others. The programme is delivered by a team of five and is in the second year of a fiveyear delivery phase. The project is managed by the Southern Uplands Partnership (SUP), a charity with 25 years' experience of developing and delivering sustainable development projects across the south of Scotland.

The survey doesn't require you to go out and look for anything, only to report what you've seen (or not seen) historically.




