South West Scotland Coastal Trail

During the short period that the project has been operating, key achievements have been made in establishing a route, and on getting the project visible to the wider communities and stakeholders that will be key in the delivery of this project.

- Surveys conducted on core path from Gretna to Dumfries.
- Scoping work carried out on the options of connecting the missing links.
- Trail reports and costing completed for all sections from Gretna to Powfoot.
- Meeting with stakeholders and local landowners.
- Applications for funding submitted for improvements to current core paths, and also future events.
- Appointments to visit local Community Councils and agencies to promote the project, and get feedback on the proposals.







There has also been promotion of the project in the local press, social media and presenting the vision of the South West Scotland Coastal Way to over 180 delegates at the SSDA conference in March. Discussions have also been developing with various stakeholders and local landowners of the possibilities of utilising their areas of operation to formally recognise an access right across their lands, which has been met with only positive responses.

The plan going forward is to continue with on the ground surveys to establish a route that will be feasible to develop, with the buy-in from the retrospective land owners, local communities and to work closely with the various stakeholders and funders that will be key in helping this vision become reality.

Barnaby Fryer – Loch Ken Trust officer, Introduction to the Loch Ken Plan:


Finally, after almost 2 years in the making, the Loch Ken Plan is finished!

South West Scotland Environmental Information Centre (SWSEIC)

Glengarnock Castle Bioblitz

<u>SWSEIC</u>, along with Gill Smart of Scottish Wildlife Trust, led a bioblitz at Glengarnock Castle, near Kilburnie, on Sunday 22 May, as part of the <u>Garnock Connections Landscape Partnership</u>. The event was timed to coincide with archaeological excavations at the castle. Around 130 species were recorded. Highlights included Whorled Caraway Carum verticillatum, a scarce plant in Ayrshire. A summary of the results from the day can be viewed here.





Kirkcudbright Bay family bioblitz - This 'nature hunt for everyone' took place on Saturday 4 June, as part of the Kirkcudbright Bay Wildlife Weekend. In partnership with our friends at Solway Firth Partnership, SWSEIC ran family-friendly wildlife activities at Nun Mill Bay (The Dhoon), timed to celebrate the international World Oceans Day and supported by the Galloway Glens Landscape Partnership. There were guided walks, shell displays, and children's activities with the Freelance Ranger.



DECBG Community Officer: Developing Local Projects

The Dumfriesshire East Community Benefit Group, with support from Southern Uplands Partnership, has been distributing funds to surrounding communities from the ScottishPower Renewables Ewe Hill 16 windfarm since 2017. In January 2022 Jamie Dent was appointed to the post of Community Officer with the task of supporting local groups in the development of projects and in accessing funding both from Ewe Hill and from other funders. The post was created following a lengthy community consultation which identified a shortfall in capacity and specialist knowledge.

Since he came into post Jamie has been working to engage with local groups and is currently supporting more than 14 projects at varying stages of development across the 16 communities in Eskdale and Annandale covered by the fund. "My main aims at this stage are to engage with as many groups and communities as possible, to increase the amount of external match funding and to increase the scope and scale of local projects".

The projects under development at the moment address a broad range of issues from village hall improvements to projects tackling skills, employment and isolation issues. "I am hoping to encourage groups by taking inspiration and examples of best practice from elsewhere and adapting them to the region to make best use of the opportunity presented by injection of windfarm funds directly to community groups. Communities are in a position to make lasting changes and improvements as a result of this unprecedented influx of funds to rural areas. I hope to enable local people to make the most of these resources."

Jamie grew up in Nithsdale and has a background in urban planning, sustainable development and rural affordable housing.

Talla-Hartfell Wild Land Area

The Talla-Hartfell Wild Land Area project has just been awarded further funding from Rewilding Britain to continue exploring ways in which the Moffat-Tweedsmuir-Ettrick area can benefit from a nature-based economy. Over the last 18 months a number of potential projects have been identified, and over the next 12-15 months several of these will be taken forward, including:

- The development of a Charter to which anyone can sign up to show their support for the Talla-Hartfell Wild Land Area and surrounding valleys.
- A series of talks focusing on topics relevant to the project area and to the broader Southern Uplands in general.
- Ongoing discussions with local landowners, businesses, community groups, residents and stakeholders.
- Further development of the digital Talla-Hartfell Ecomuseum, the first phase of which was completed earlier this year and can be viewed at <u>tallahartfell.ecomuseum.online</u>
- Scoping a circular walking trail around the Wild Land Area and surrounding valleys.
- Development of a mapping project to map habitats, landowner boundaries and tree planting across the area.
- Capturing drone footage at various points across the area.

South Scotland Climate Action Hubs:

In mid-May, Pip and I attended the first meeting set up by the Scottish Government's Climate Change Division to establish a Community Climate Action Hub in Dumfries and Galloway. These are intended as a way to support communities to make the transition to low carbon and climate resilient living by providing a vehicle for communities to come together and engage in collective climate action. A Scottish Borders Climate Action Hub is already in the pipeline and a SCCAN (Scottish Communities Climate Action Network) Climate Action Network Coordinator for the Borders was appointed to start on the 6th of June (Gordie Campbell - an old friend of Southern Uplands Partnership!) A further Dumfries and Galloway meeting is planned – if you would like to be involved in either, send me an email at katy@sup.org.uk





Connecting Environmental degree programmes with Organisations on the ground:

We've also been further exploring ways to better connect our excellent South Scotland academic institutions' environmental science, environmental humanities and sustainable tourism degrees with the many well-established South Scotland environmental organisations in order to establish better links for research and collaboration and ultimately better routes to green jobs in South Scotland – again, watch this space!

Darren's news...

Website revamp: The refresh of the old www.sup.org.uk website continued apace over the last few months and, after a lot of work, is now live - more details over the coming pages....

Projects: I've been working up a number of project plans for a broad range of activities spanning environment, communities, species protection and tourism. Some of these are SUP generated and led pieces of work, while others are part of a wider partnership.

Black Grouse: the recent work by Jen Clark, developing a Black Grouse recovery project called 'Undoing the Silence of the Uplands', worked with a long list of landowners and stakeholders to look at the species data and identify possible ways forward to aid the species' recovery. We are now taking this a stage further to work this up in to a multifaceted landscape project that is ready for pitching for funding. The project could include everything from volunteer opportunities and tree nurseries, to trees in classrooms and a soundscape arts project based on the distinctive black grouse call. This will be a partnership with Borders Forest Trust, Galloway and Southern Ayrshire Biosphere, John Muir Trust, RSPB Scotland, and Tweed Forum.



Tourism awareness and training: We have been working up a plan to potentially deliver a tourism training package to businesses and individuals with a tourism interest across southern Scotland. This presently has three strands, talks about the tourism product in South Scotland, a series of "fam trips" enabling those in visitor facing roles to act as ambassadors and promote the area, and a series of local tour guide training sessions across Dumfries & Galloway and the Scottish Borders.

Other bits and bobs... I've also been working with a couple of communities that are interested in creating Community Project Officer roles for their area to help groups with funding bids and unlock funding for larger scale projects. I've also been working on recruiting some freelance community consultants (see recruitment section below), and a big tendering pitch, but I can't really say any more about that one until we know if we have been successful (or not!).

- Community-led Regeneration
- Ensuring a just transition to Net Zero
